

ANTHROPOLOGY

Archaeology

A branch of anthropology focusing on the analysis of human material remains as an attempt to reconstruct past cultures.

SOME COMMON METHODS

Excavation: Uncovering buried materials from the past so that they may be recorded and analyzed.
Survey: Locating artifacts and potential sites through methods such as ground sniffing, soil erosion and surface marker survey techniques.

Grid system: A technique used in excavation allowing better recording of the location of artifacts. A grid is imposed and each site excavation area, which is then excavated one layer at a time and mapped according to the grid system.

DATING TYPES

Relative dating: The assigned degree of antiquity is determined in relation to other artifacts to determine a relative age.

Absolute dating: Also known as chronometric dating, determines the actual age of an artifact in terms of years, centuries, or other units of time.

• **Radioactive (C-14) dating:** Measures dating method measuring the half-life and decay rate of C-14 to determine the age of organic materials.

• **Carbon 14 measurement:** A chronometric dating technique used to identify materials without changes in position where an organism dies to calculate the age of death.

• **Potassium-argon (K-Ar) dating:** Chronometric dating method measuring the decay of potassium-40 into argon-40 by 40% to estimate age.

• **Thermoluminescence dating:** Another dating technique used in conjunction with potassium-argon dating that estimates relative quantities of argon-39 to argon-40 gases in volcanic deposits.

• **Stratigraphic dating:** Chronometric dating of absolute artifacts by measuring the water absorbed in profile sections of the artifact.

• **Thermoluminescence dating:** Absolute dating technique used to determine the age of ceramics, glass, bricks and any other heat-treating artifacts.

• **Dendrochronology:** Also known as tree-ring dating, this technique dating technique compares a tree sample that is known archaeologically to an established tree-ring chronology for the year to determine the year the wood was first utilized by humans.

• **Electron spin resonance:** Chronometric dating method that measures trapped electrons in shell and bone.

POTTERY

• All fired clay products made by humans.
• Hundreds of types: floor storage vessels, cooking pots, bowls, burial urns, pipes, etc.

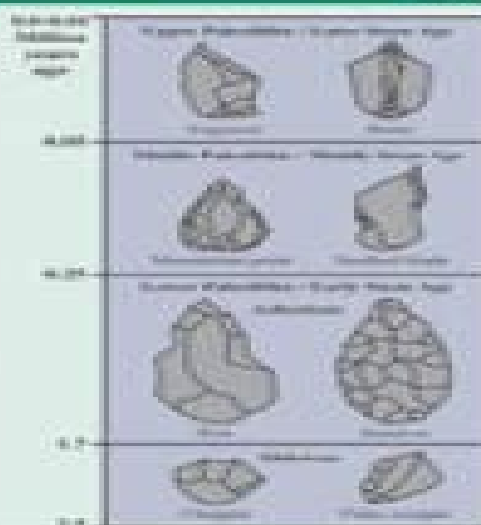
• Widely-used way to tell of the social, technological, cultural and economic status of a site.

Tool Traditions

- **Oldowan tool tradition:**
 - The earliest identifiable tool-making tradition, associated with Homo habilis, the Oldovan began the Paleolithic about 2.5 million years ago.
 - Tools were made by striking a stone core, producing flakes which were used as blades and scrapers; the cores were used as hammers.
 - Property tool produced was the pebble chopper.
- **Acheulean tool tradition:** Tool-making tradition, after the Oldovan period, during time about 1.7 million years ago, associated with Homo erectus.
 - Made the same type as stone, but much bigger and allowing to make standardized shapes.
 - Primary tool produced was the bifacial hand axe, a pear-shaped tool.
- **Mousterian tool tradition:** Tool-making tradition of the Neanderthal from 40,000 - 40,000 years ago in Europe, Southwest Asia, Northern Africa.
 - Tools generally much smaller, more varied and made more skillfully worked than those previous.
 - Tool makers utilized pressure-flaking techniques in contrast to the earlier percussion flaking techniques.

Tool Technologies

- **Levallois flint** often in the Mousterian tool tradition. (Like most of modern stone tools made by striking a shaped core).
- **Blade technology:** Blade produced by striking a core of stone.
- **Pressure flaking:** Stone, either on small scale used to press small flakes off a flint core.
- **Adze:** But most common was the flaked flint.

TRANSITIONAL PERIODS

Precolonial in the New World

- Generally, "Old World", first group of humans to come to the New World.
- First non-African group (Paleolithic) came to the New World, sometime before 12,000 years ago, during the Pleistocene ("Old Stone Age").
- Second group, big game animals, known for domesticated food production.

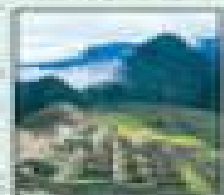
Mesoamerica

- Generally, "Middle Stone Age", archaeological period of time beginning around 12,000 B.C.
- Humans became more sedentary and began to collect on more stationary food resources.
- **Neolithic:** A cultural tradition beginning in Neolithic Asia during the Neolithic period.
 - Consisted of the first people who developed permanent settlements and began domestication of their land.
- **Neolithic:** Term applied to Neolithic culture in the New World.
 - Characterized by increased cultural diversity in populations adapted to different environments.
 - Created an array of cultures with unique life-ways and technologies.

South America

- Generally, "New Stone Age", archaeological period and social development beginning about 12,000 years ago in the Middle East.
- **Domestication of plants and animals:** Revolutionary practice where humans (domestication) of agricultural food supply phase and animal domestication to human control this revolution.
- **Early cities:**
 - **Lower:** The Incas began the domestication of wheat, barley and maize (corn) 10,000 B.C.

- **Europe:** General Lower and upper domestication was early in 10,000 B.C.
- **Asia:** - Middle Stone Age, Upper and post domestication from 12,000 B.C.
- **China:** - Neolithic and southern, early rice cultivation, about 7,000 B.C.
- **South America:** - Neolithic, early rice cultivation, about 7,000 B.C.
