Smith, 2016-12-14 As Spain and African origin together England vied for dominance of the Atlantic world during the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries mounting political and religious tensions between the two empires raised a troubling specter for contemporary British writers attempting to justify early English imperial efforts Specifically these writers focused on encounters with black Africans throughout the Atlantic world attempting to use these points of contact to articulate and defend England's global ambitions In Black Africans in the British Imagination Cassander L Smith investigates how the physical presence of black Africans both enabled and disrupted English literary responses to Spanish imperialism By examining the extent to which this population helped to shape early English narratives from political pamphlets to travelogues Smith offers new perspectives on the literary social and political

Blackness in Western Europe Dienke Hondius, 2017-09-29 While the study of race relations in the United States continues to inspire and influence European thinking Europeans have yet to confront their own history To be black in Europe whether during the sixteenth century or today means sharing one crucial experience being part of a small but visible minority European slave owners company directors and investors in the distant past maintained an ocean wide gap between themselves and the enslaved in the plantation colonies of the Caribbean In the following centuries this distance persisted Even today to be black in Europe often means to be one of a few black persons in a group A racial pattern of exclusion has characterized European policy for more than four centuries Dienke Hondius identifies ideas and attitudes toward blackness the concept of race as visible difference developed in western Europe She argues that racial discourses are generally dominated by paternalism a concept usually used to explain power structures that is often applied to the nineteenth century Hondius identifies five patterns of paternalism that influenced Europe much earlier and iniated trends of imagery and perception Taking a chronological and thematic approach Hondius first focuses on southern European societies in the Early Modern period and moves to northwest European societies in the Modern period Addressing religion law and science she concludes with a synthesis of developments from the twentieth century to the present Africa in Europe: Antiquity into the age of global expansion Stefan Goodwin, 2009-01-01 Africa in Europe in two volumes is an interdisciplinary work about Europeans that demonstrates fluid boundaries and connections between them and Africans from antiquity until the present
