longer expect that their first choice of antibiotic for women s urinary tract infections or children s ear infections will work Similarly cancer therapy is rendered useless if patients are unable to fight infections that are sometimes resistant to eight to ten different drugs In developing countries people are now dying of previously treatable diseases that are no longer responsive to traditional antibiotics These problems are just a harbinger of what will come if we do not act now Dr Levy recognized by The New Yorker for his superb contributions to this field is sending out an urgent message that the world cannot afford to ignore any longer The goal of this unprecedented investigation into the dangers of antibiotic misuse is to protect the world community from resistant infections and ensure the success of antibiotics for generations to come
