profit making or financial viability This social responsibility rooted in knowledge creation and societal advancement should remain the primary focus Although commercialisation is an unavoidable reality HEIs should ultimately prioritise their social mandate over profit driven objectives ensuring that their core mission is not overshadowed by commercial imperatives
