

Blue Ridge 2020 Steve Nash,1999 Aimed at the millions of Americans who treasure the public lands of the Blue Ridge mountains this book presents a clear account of the environmental issues that threaten these natural areas and outlines the steps citizens must take to ensure their future **Blue Ridge 2020** Steve Nash,2003-07-11 The mountain chain known as the Blue Ridge traces a 550 mile arc through Pennsylvania Virginia North Carolina Tennessee South Carolina and Georgia Along the way it encompasses Shenandoah National Park Great Smoky Mountains National Park the Blue Ridge Parkway seven national forests numerous federal wilderness areas and state parks and parts of the Appalachian Trail It is the largest concentration of public lands east of the Mississippi and home to an astonishing diversity of plant and animal life But as the most extensive natural area in the increasingly populous Southeast the Blue Ridge ecosystem faces unique challenges in the next decades Drawing on scientific research in a variety of disciplines journalist Steve Nash provides a clear and evenhanded introduction to some of the most hotly disputed environmental issues facing the Blue Ridge including the invasion of exotic plants and insects the explosive growth of suburban style communities in natural areas worsening air and water pollution and the erratic management of national forests Informative and highly readable *Blue Ridge 2020* takes a hard look at what is at risk in these mountains and what we as the owners of the public lands must do if we intend to preserve their future

Swanson,2018 *Beyond the Mountains* explores the ways in which Appalachia often served as a laboratory for the exploration and practice of American conceptions of nature The region operated alternately as frontier wilderness rural hinterland region of subsistence agriculture bastion of yeoman farmers and place to experiment with modernization In these various takes on the southern mountains scattered across time and space both mountain residents and outsiders consistently believed that the region s

environment made Appalachia distinctive for better or worse With chapters dedicated to microhistories focused on particular commodities Drew A Swanson builds upon recent Appalachian studies scholarship emphasizing the diversity of a region so long considered a homogenous backwater While Appalachia has a recognizable and real coherence rooted in folkways agriculture and politics among other things it is also a region of varied environments people and histories These discrete stories are however linked through the power of conceptualizing nature and work together to reveal the ways in which ideas and uses of nature often created a sense of identity in Appalachia Delving into the environmental history of the region reveals that Appalachian environments rather than separating the mountains from the broader world often served to connect the region to outside places

Power and Place Melinda Bollar Wagner, 2023-12-12 Rural life and culture hold a practical and symbolic importance in American society A central tenet of the survival of our cherished values and of ourselves as a species is the stewardship of cultural diversity and the places that foster it like rural America These may be the places that teach us to use land to make a living and to make a life to forge and carry on our identities and to feel history They may yield a harvest of policies for managing an environmental balancing act that will preserve essential resources for America's children's children *Power and Place* Preservation Progress and the Culture War over Land examines the ongoing culture wars that pit conservation against economic progress For author Melinda Bollar Wagner what began as a study of Appalachia's long standing and continuing status as an energy sacrifice zone evolved into a twenty four year research project that sheds new light on the physical and emotional parameters of cultural attachment to land Drawing on interviews with more than 220 residents from ten communities in five Appalachian counties *Power and Place* gives voice to rural citizens whose place at the table is far from assured with regard to critical energy environmental and infrastructure decisions

Do, Die, Or Get Along Peter Crow, 2010-09-15 *Do Die or Get Along* weaves together voices of twenty six people who have intimate connections to two neighboring towns in the southwestern Virginia coal country Filled with evidence of a new kind of local outlook on the widespread challenge of small community survival the book tells how a confrontational do or die past has given way to a get along present built on coalition and guarded hope St Paul and Dante are six miles apart measured in other ways the distance can be greater Dante for decades a company town controlled at all levels by the mine owners has only a recent history of civic initiative In St Paul which arose at a railroad junction public debate entrepreneurship and education found a more receptive home The speakers are men and women wealthy and poor black and white old timers and newcomers Their concerns and interests range widely including the battle over strip mining efforts to control flooding the 1989-90 Pittston strike the nationally acclaimed Wetlands Estimation Project and the grassroots revitalization of both towns led by the St Paul Tomorrow and Dante Lives On organizations Their talk of the past often invokes an ethos rooted in the hand to mouth pioneer era of short term gain Just as frequently however talk turns to more recent times when community leaders corporations unions the federal government and environmental groups have begun to seek accord based on what will be best

in the long run for the towns The story of Dante and St Paul Crow writes gives twenty first century meaning to the idea of the good fight This is an absorbing account of persistence resourcefulness and eclectic redefinition of success and community revival with ramifications well beyond Appalachia **America's Natural Places: South and Southeast** Stacy S.

problematic Nash reports on the controversies over genetically modified pines and poplars science fiction trees and how fears of their escape into wild forests has prompted some environmentalists to go so far as to sabotage corporate laboratories The urgency Nash conveys is real as one of his subjects observes it is much easier to maintain an ecosystem than repair it There is no escaping a feeling of apprehension over the destructive dynamics Nash uncovers Nevertheless the essays collected here stress the opportunity that is still there for policies to be established that serve humankind by better serving nature
